The Weare Lions Club welcomes Keryn Bernard-Kriegl, Executive Director of the New Hampshire Children's Trust, whose motto is "Building a New Hampshire where all children grow up free from abuse and neglect". The Trust is leading the drive to ensure safe, stable, and nurturing relationships and environments for children by educating, advocating, and collaborating. They invest in evidence-based prevention strategies focusing on expectant families and children from birth through age 8, and what you can do in your community to help. Founded in 1986 as a quasi-governmental organization, the agency transitioned to the New Hampshire Children's Trust, Inc., a 501(c)(3) nonprofit corporation in 2011.

Keryn Bernard-Kriegl joined the New Hampshire Children's Trust in 2009, after 20 years of working for children and families in New Hampshire. Keryn holds her MS in Family Studies from Wheelock College in Boston, Massachusetts and a BS in Leisure Management and Tourism Program Administration and a Certificate in Supervisory Skills from the University of New Hampshire. She was a member of Leadership NH Class of 2014. Keryn has served on several non-profit boards and has held many volunteer positions around the Granite State. Keryn has two sons attending NH Colleges and lives in Dover. She is a strong believer that every child deserves a great childhood.

The Weare Lions Club raises funds to help Weare residents with vision and hearing difficulties, does vision scanning in Weare schools, and performs service projects all year long. ## **Be Nice to Each Other and WALK UP**

"Be nice to each other," said John Stark High School Student Council President Jake Reynolds at March's observance of the tragedy in Parkland, Florida, in the Cafeteria at John Stark Regional High School.

Be nice to each other and WALK UP was the theme of the event, which was planned and presented by members of John Stark's Student Council. The Student Council leaders asked those gathered to walk up to someone sitting alone, someone you don't know. Walk up and get to know them.

The assembly was attended by more than half the student body of 657 and was voluntary. If a student did not wish to attend the observance, they did not.

Senior Jake Reynolds was joined by senior Marisa Dobbins, who presented a slide show featuring the images and biographies of all 17 victims of Parkland. Three additional student leaders, senior Skylar Bergeron, sophomore Eve Caplan and junior Trinette Hunter spoke and continued with the same message— no matter where you stand on issues like having guns or not having guns, we all want the same thing, to be safe at school. All of the speakers urged others to use their voice to make sure that change happens.

Trinette Hunter also recited the poem, "Of History and Hope," by Miller Williams. Additionally, 17 candles were lit in memory of those who lost their lives in Florida.

Peer Leaders at John Stark have also pledged to speak to 17 people they don't know or see alone for the next five days. That's 31 Peer Leaders, times 17 people, times 5 days. That is 2,635 human contacts in one week.

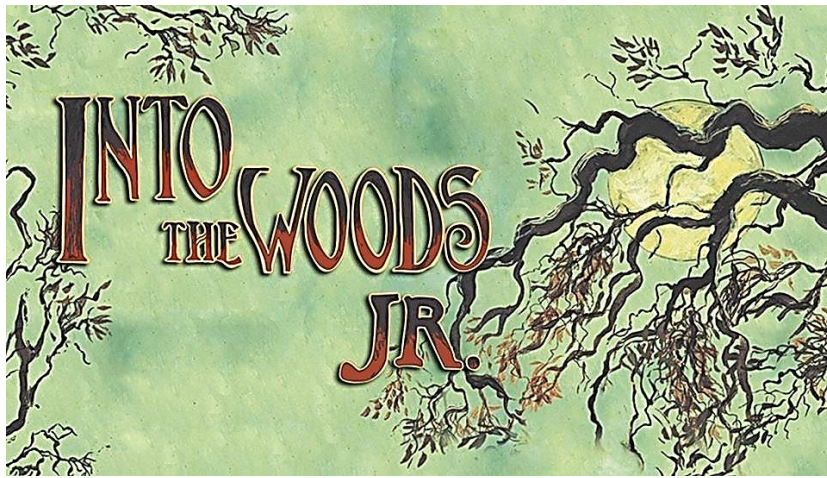

## **The Sculpture of Augustus Saint-Gaudens**

**At the Currier Museum, 150 Ash Street, Manchester**

Weare Library card holders can get a glimpse of New Hampshire's, and indeed America's, premier sculptor in a special exhibition of the works of Augustus Saint-Gaudens (1848–1907) in the first major exhibition of his work to be held in New England in more than 30 years. The exhibition includes many of his large-scale masterpieces including Abraham Lincoln: The Man, the Adams Memorial, and Diana.

Saint-Gaudens transformed American sculpture by creating figures from recent history in heroic scale. His monuments defined America's response to the Civil War. The Shaw Memorial took 14 years to complete and was the first public sculpture to depict heroic African-American soldiers of the Civil War. Saint-Gaudens' Diana of 1893 balanced atop the tower on the newly erected Madison Square Garden in New York.

During the height of his career, the artist directed busy studios in Paris, Rome, and New York. But Saint-Gaudens was also a New Hampshire artist for much of his life, maintaining a studio in Cornish. He was the founding artist of the Cornish Colony where he summered beginning in 1885, and lived there year-round from 1900 until his death in 1907. His home and studios are now managed by the National Park Service.

Check the Museum's calendar at [currier.org](http://currier.org) for guided tours of the exhibit, which runs through May 20. The Weare Public Library pass is available to library card holders. If you live, work, or go to school in Weare you can have a library card for free. Passes allow two free admissions, one pass per day, and must be reserved by calling 529-2044 or stopping by the library during library hours.

## **Building Fire, 125 Buzzell Hill Road**

On March 17, 2018, at 0930 hours one of the three occupants at 125 Buzzell Hill Road called 9-1-1 to report a fire in the basement. The Weare Fire Department was dispatched and was on scene of the one and a half story residential building within six minutes of the initial call.

On their arrival, Engine 5 staffed with the on-duty crew, stretched a hoseline and began to extinguish the fire in the basement. After knocking down the small fire, crews continued to work opening up walls in search of hidden fire. Firefighters found additional fire in the wall space directly above the involved basement area.

Weare Fire Chief Robert Vezina believes a quick response and aggressive tactics from Weare's on-duty crew resulted in rapid control of the fire. As the fire was confined to the area of origin, firefighters were able to prevent damage to most of the home's furnishings.

The cause of the fire is due to the operation of a wood stove. The majority of the damage was confined to the wall assembly directly behind the brick wall protection used as a clearance reduction system. The occupants are staying with family and friends in the area. No civilians or fire personnel were injured.

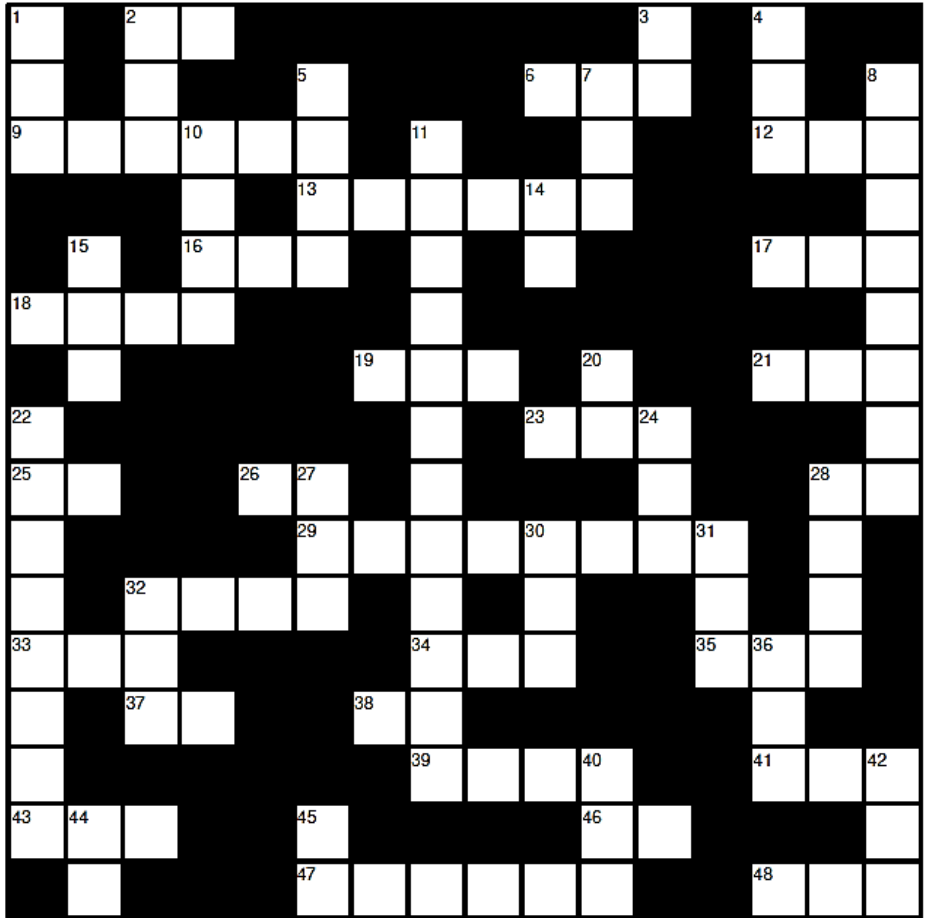

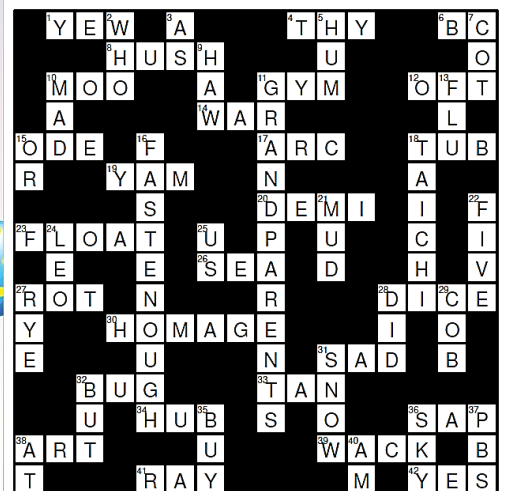
